TUMBY BAY JETTY UPDATE

Dear Community,

I am pleased to offer a further update on our community jetty following the last update on November 21, 2023. We are in the process of developing a timeline for community consultation, having continued to work with the State Government to obtain all of the information we need to allow us all to make an informed decision about the future of our jetty.

Over the years, the Council has sought the State Government's assistance in refurbishing the jetty. Simultaneously, the State Government initiated the Tumby Bay Jetty Business Case to assess costs and explore options. Officers from the Department of Infrastructure and Transport (DIT) recommended Council wait for the Business Case outcomes before commencing works.

As this process was unfolding, unexpected and severe storm damage led to the jetty's closure. The Council engaged its consultant to review the Business Case, who recommended that replacing the jetty is the only sustainable option. This aligns with the State Government's Business Case, emphasizing a sustainable, long-term solution that is in the community's best interest from a social, recreational and tourism perspective.

A short-term fix, applying similar funds, has been deemed unsuitable given the risk of further structural failures when the next big storm hits. All indications are pointing to a long-term, sustainable solution, that will make our much-loved jetty accessible again for current and future generations.

Elected members are exploring various options to share with the community, including an Expression of Interest (EOI) to the State Government's SA Jetties Renewals Program which makes the nominal total of \$10m available for the refurbishment of jetties across all of South Australia.

It is crucial to note that this is just one of several options under consideration.

The EOI process serves as a starting point for the way forward, recognizing that the financial contribution from State Government towards the refurbishment or replacement of our jetty is unknown, and ratepayers will be expected to contribute. All indications thus far, are that the State Government will not be paying for the refurbishment of our jetty, as well as all of the other jetties across South Australia that require similar refurbishment or replacement. We are one of many communities seeking similar support for which funding is simply not available.

By the end of January, the Council expects to receive feedback from the State Government on the EOI, paving the way for continued discussions with the DIT.

Council is aiming to finalize options and assess their impact on the Long-Term Financial Plan and its capacity for long-term loan borrowing recognizing that loan repayments and ongoing maintenance of a new jetty will very likely need to be funded by ratepayers. As a collective, we can then make an informed decision about what is best for us as a community.

Council hopes to be able to share with the community the options we have with regards to the jetty and Tumby Bay foreshore in February.

Council News

Works Report

Hello and welcome to 2024.

Tumby Bay received significant rainfall around 7.30am Sunday 7th January with reports of up to 45mm falling in 1 hour. This intensity is consistent with a 1% average exceedance probability event, i.e. 1 in 100 year rainfall for a 1 hour storm event, with reports of rainfall totals of 55–75mm across our district during the period between 7am–11:30am.

This storm event, amongst other flooding issues caused significant damage to the foreshore drainage outlets. Not an ideal time at the height of tourist season. Great job by the construction crew remediating in a timely manner.

A personal special thanks to our on-call team for promptly dealing with some potentially serious issues during the festive break.

Speaking of tourist time, the wastewater treatment plant has been working overtime dealing with double the usual influx of water from the system.

Rubbish has been high as expected this time of year and the public toilet paper has been running out by the kilometre.

The boat ramp and carpark have been hectic. We managed to get a space in the line up to give it a scrub with the brush to keep the slippery slime away.

Great to see so many visitors in our town enjoying picnics on the beautiful lawns.

As always, keep safe and drive to the road conditions.

Consultation on updating South Australia's bushfire hazard policy and mapping is now open



South Australians are invited to have their say on a proposal to update bushfire hazard mapping and effectively plan for and mitigate the impacts of bushfire hazards across the state.

The State-wide Bushfire Hazards Overlay Code Amendment is being undertaken by the State Planning Commission and seeks to update the spatial application of the bushfire hazard overlays to reflect recent bushfire hazard mapping, and review the policy contained in each of the overlays.

In May 2022, the South Australian Government declared a climate emergency. Climate change is expected to result in more frequent and intense extreme weather events. Severe bushfires will occur more often and, without action, will have devastating impacts on our communities. These proposed changes to the Code aim to better reflect bushfire risk across the state and introduce new rules to help save lives and build more climate-resilient communities.

The draft Code Amendment proposes to update existing bushfire hazard mapping and apply new bushfire hazard mapping where the level of bushfire hazard has not previously been mapped.

In addition to updating the bushfire hazard mapping across the state, the draft Code Amendment also seeks to deliver an improved policy framework to enable more effective assessment of development in areas of bushfire hazard risk, putting in place policy that aims to minimise bushfire risk on people, property, infrastructure, the environment and economy.

Bushfire hazard mapping has been undertaken for most of the state with the application of 'high', 'medium' and 'general' bushfire risk areas.

The draft Code Amendment is out for community engagement from 23 November 2023 to 5:00 pm, 8 March 2024.

A series of in-person and online public information sessions will be held in early 2024. Details will be published on the YourSAy website.





Cyril was born on 30th Mar 1896 at Port Lincoln to Joseph William Weldrick France and Sarah France (née Carr). He was the second eldest of 7 children in the family, 5 boys and 2 girls. His father initially share farmed at Butler (Sect 9, Hd of Butler), later purchasing a farm in Hd of Yarranyacka and moving to Lipson.

He went to school at Yarranyacka/Lipson, leaving at Grade 5 to work on the family farm and other farms in the area. In 1914 he joined the Lipson Mounted Scouts Unit; this was the only mounted scouts unit recognised by the military in Australia. On 3rd Mar 1916 he enlisted in the Army giving his occupation as Farm Hand, his address as PO Lipson via Tumby Bay and his mother as next of kin.

He reported to Base Light Horse Squadron at Mitcham for training on 9th Mar 1916; during training he was allocated to 22nd Reinforcements/9th Light Horse Regiment on 1 Jul 1916. On completion of training he embarked at Adelaide on 4th Nov 1916 aboard HMAT "Bakara" bound for the Middle East, disembarking at Suez on 4th Dec 1916. As was the norm, he was immediately moved to Isolation Camp.

On 12th Jan 1917 he was released from isolation camp and taken on strength by 3rd Light Horse Training Regiment at Moascar. A fortnight later he was detached to the Imperial School of Instruction at Zeitoun to undertake a Machine Gunners Course which he successfully completed before returning to the Training Regiment on 17th Feb 1917. A month later he was posted to 3rd Australian Light Horse Machine Gun Squadron as a "Machine Gunner – First Class". Unfortunately he was not taken on strength by his unit until 14th Apr 1917 as he was admitted to hospital for a month with a lung problem.

On 1st May 1917 he was again admitted to hospital at El Arish, where he remained for a fortnight before returning to his unit. Then followed a series of hospital admissions spaced over several months until an admission on 23rd Mar 1919, when he was finally diagnosed with Malaria. A month later he embarked at Port Said aboard HMAT "Dorset" for return to Australia, disembarking at Adelaide on 23rd May 1919. He took his discharge on 2nd Aug 1919 and returned to Tumby Bay.

It is not known how he met his wife to be, but on 7th Nov 1923 he married Jessie May Nicholson at St. Andrews Presbyterian Church in Naracoorte (SA) and they returned to Tumby Bay to live in a house on West Terrace. It was here that they raised their family of 2 children, a boy and a girl, both of whom attended Tumby Bay School.

On 25th May 1942 Cyril again enlisted in the Army. He was allocated to A company, 5th Volunteer Defence Corps, the local militia company at Tumby Bay. At this time he gave his occupation as Line Foreman, his address as Tumby Bay and his wife as next of kin

He was promoted to Lance Sergeant 1st Jan 1943. He must have been an above average soldier as he was promoted/commissioned to Lieutenant on 30th Nov 1944. However, his poor health continued to dog him as he was admitted to hospital with Pneumonia and classified as "very seriously ill". This illness would remain with him long after he was placed on the Retired List.

After discharge on 25th Nov 1945 he remained in Tumby Bay for several years before moving to Adelaide and living at Cumberland.

Cyril died on 15th Dec 1963 at the age of 67 years and is buried in the RSL Section of Centennial Park Cemetery in Adelaide. His wife, Jessie, died on 5th Mar 1965 and is buried with her husband at Centennial Park Cemetery.

Cyril's name is recorded on the Lipson Honour Board and his photograph is displayed in the Tumby Bay RSL Portraits Memorial.


