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Mayor's Words

April is the month to take time and reflect and to thank our war veterans for their sacrifice so we can enjoy the peaceful life we have now. The dawn service on April 25th at 6.45am is the perfect time to pay your respects to the surviving diggers of our District and to say 'thankyou'.

As you may well have read, Maritime Constructions came to Council with a proposal to get work done for the Tumby Bay Jetty. Last week saw the first step, with load bearing test work being conducted. These tests saw a positive result and the second stage will commence in the next week or so. Hopefully the jetty will then be open for pedestrian traffic.

I will be taking the issue of jetty funding to the Australian Local Government Association meeting in July this year to press the Federal Government for them to support financially with the repairs and renewals of jetties, not only here in Tumby Bay but right around the Country. I believe jetties are used not only by local people but interstate and overseas visitors, so it is a Federal issue.

I would also like to thank the Tumby Bay Progress Association for their generous donation toward the current repairs. This donation is very much appreciated.

I have been asked several times about the results of the recent survey. 51% of ratepayers returned the survey. Of those, 83% responded no to a jetty levy. Council will continue to look for a financially sustainable option for the future of the jetty.

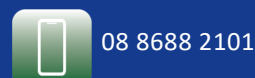

Deputy CEO's News

2024-2039 Draft Asset Management Plans & Long-Term Financial Plan – Public Consultation

Council's executive team have spent the past six months working on new 15-year Asset Management Plans and a Long-Term Financial Plan for the 2024-2039 period.

The new asset plans have been prepared using the latest valuation and condition data and cover all aspects of asset management within the Council district.

Council has the following asset management plans for its various classes of assets:

- Plant and Equipment
- Buildings and Structures
- Community Wastewater Management Systems
- Transport and Stormwater

Each asset management plan includes projections for maintenance, capital renewal and new and upgraded assets. It is important to note that all values within the asset management plans are based on current day costs in 2024. Asset management plans are a vital component of long-term financial planning, with all projected asset expenditure incorporated in the Council's Long-Term Financial Plan. Distinctly different to the asset management plans, all values included within the long-term financial plan are indexed to represent the expected cost at time of delivery.

The long-term financial plan maps out projected Council income and expenditure for the planning period and uses several assumptions to estimate future costs and income requirements. As mentioned previously, all values within the long-term financial plan are indexed to represent the expected cost at time of delivery. The formulation of the current draft Long-Term Financial Plan has been a challenge for Council with major expenditure items including foreshore mitigation, recreational jetties, asset renewals and asset upgrades, all placing pressure on required general rate income.

Council will be meeting on Tuesday 23rd April to consider the draft plans and provide direction on any proposed changes in readiness for the plans to be made available for public consultation in April/May 2024. Consultation will include a public meeting in early May (date to be confirmed) and we encourage all community members to take the opportunity to review the plans once released and come along to the meeting to hear what is being proposed for the next 15 years.

The draft plans, once adopted, will provide direction for the next 15 years and will be used in the formulation of Annual Business Plans and budgets during this time. To ensure the plans remain relevant and continue to meet the community needs, all plans will be reviewed annually prior to the budget process and will be the subject of a major review following the next Local Government periodical elections.

National Walk Safely to School Day, Friday 10 May

Walk Safely to School Day (WSTSD) is an annual campaign which encourages primary school children, their parents and carers, to walk safely and regularly to school.

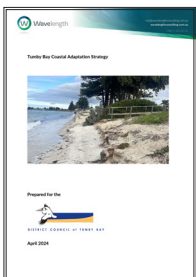


We know how important it is for children and young people to be active every day. Physical activity has many social, emotional, physical and mental health benefits. Walking to school is a great way to incorporate physical activity into a daily routine to support healthy development. Regular physical activity, especially walking, can improve self-esteem and confidence, help concentration in school and improve overall fitness.

Council will be holding a colouring in competition, liaising with each (primary) school, in the lead up to WSTSD, which can be completed at school or home. I encourage parents and carers to use this opportunity to have a conversation about vital road safety rules.

The WSTSD campaign reminds adults that children under 10 should be holding an adult's hand when crossing the road.

Tumby Bay Coastal Adaptation Strategy



Council commissioned Wavelength Consulting to develop a Coastal Adaptation Strategy (CAS). This strategy recommends specific priority adaptation pathways to manage coastal erosion and inundation risks taking into account economic, environmental and community considerations.

The purpose of the CAS is to:

- identify assets and values (public and private) and the risk posed to them by coastal hazards
- develop a plan that will allow DCTB to respond to identified risks through adaptation planning processes
- recommend specific actions and future monitoring to ensure the risk management and adaptation plan activities are working into the future as expected and guide their implementation over time.

This study considers a 76-year planning timeframe (to 2100) in line with adaptation planning best practice with consideration of coastal hazards under current and future (2050 and 2100) sea level rise scenarios.

The Council now invites comment on the Draft Tumby Bay Coastal Adaptation Strategy.

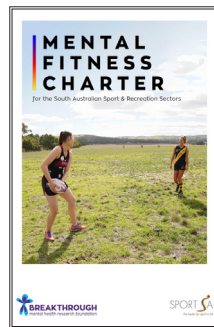

Community Bus Update

The current District Council of Tumby Bay Community Bus has been serving the ratepayers of the area since 2011, and the time has come for it to be retired.

The service provided by the bus is defined as a Passenger Transport Service under the Passenger Transport Act 1994. This Act requires that a bus used to provide a service for fee, hire or reward in rural areas can be no more than 25 year old. As our bus is turning 25 this year it will not be renewed for this purpose beyond the end of our current Operator Accreditation expiry date at the end April 2024.

The Council has planned to continue this service, and a new replacement bus is on order. Unfortunately, in the current vehicle supply market, the delivery timeframe for the new bus is currently unknown and may not be until next year.

As a result, Individuals or groups who have previously been able to access the bus on a fee for hire arrangement will not be able to do so until the new bus is delivered and approved for Passenger Transport Services. In the interim, other options including charter services might need to be considered if you are looking for bus hire.

The Council has committed to continue to make the current bus available to core users, including the Senior Citizens Club, Uringa Hostel and Red Cross on a no-hire arrangement until such time as a replacement is commissioned.

Road Closure - ANZAC DAY

The following roads in Tumby Bay will be closed for the ANZAC DAY Memorial Service from between 6.00am- 8.00am on Thursday, 25 April 2024:

- Tumby Terrace, between the Croquet Club and the North Terrace intersection.
- Mortlock Street, between Tumby Terrace and Spencer Street.

All persons taking part in the ANZAC Day Service on these roads will be exempted from all Australian Road Rules relating to pedestrian behaviour on roads.

Compliance News

Gazetted Townships | Burning of Vegetation Outside the Fire Danger Season

Section 5 of the Environment Protection (Air Quality) Policy 2016 requires people residing in gazetted townships obtain authorisation (clause 6) prior to undertaking the following outside the fire danger season – “the burning of vegetation or agricultural waste”.

The District Council of Tumby Bay hereby gives landholders within gazetted townships the authorisation to undertake burning of vegetation or agricultural waste outside a fire danger season subject to the following conditions.

Conditions of Authorisation by Council:

1. The burning activity takes place only on land owned by the person or, if leasing, on land with the consent or authority of the land owner.
2. The vegetation must have originated from the property on which it is being burnt.
3. The person should notify all adjoining neighbours at least 24 hours before the burning is to take place.
4. The person must comply with any mandatory measures and have regard to any recommended measures of a prescribed burning code or

practice that applies to the burning activity. i.e.:

- SACFS Vegetation Pile Burning – April 2015
- EPA – Burning in the Open Chart
- EPA – Air Quality Policy Brochure.

5. Burning may not be undertaken on a Sunday or Public Holiday or a day declared a day of Total Fire Ban.
6. All vegetation piles to be burnt should have a cleared break of at least 4m from any other flammable material including grass.
7. Stockpiles of vegetation (other than agricultural waste) shall not be larger than 2m x 2m x 1m high. Multiple stockpiles of vegetation (other than agricultural waste) shall not be allowed to burn at the same time.
8. Ensure you have adequate water supplies on hand to extinguish the burn. Ensure you have a hose that can reach the vegetation pile and all of the way around the pile and have tested your water supply.
9. The burning activity may only take place between 12:00 noon to 6:00pm.
10. This authorisation does not extend to any other material besides dry and matured agricultural or vegetation waste.
11. For the avoidance of doubt the policy only allows the burning of vegetation and agricultural waste and the following materials or any other hazardous waste are not permitted to be burnt:
 - Tyres
 - Green garden waste
 - Materials such as clippings and mulch – mixed in with soil
 - Plastic
 - Cardboard
 - Chemical containers
 - Treated timber
 - Other materials prescribed by legislation.

All property owners and residents must abide by this policy at all times. Conducting burning activities other than in accordance with this policy can result in maximum penalties of up to \$5,000 and expiations of \$473.

This authorisation is valid for the period 15th April 2024 until the commencement of the 2024/2025 Fire Season unless revoked.

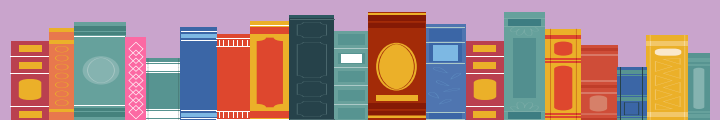

Ed was born on 22 Sep 1872 at Kangarilla (SA) to Frederick William Smart and Charlotte Smart (nee Baker). He was the third eldest of 8 children in the family, 4 boys and 4 girls. His father was a farmer at Koppio.

It is not known where he went to school. It would seem that he had a fairly rudimentary education before commencing work on the farms in the Koppio/Yallunda Flat area. On enlistment in the Army on 20 Dec 1915 at age 41 years he gave his occupation as driver, his address as Koppio, via Tumby Bay and his father as next of kin.

After enlistment Ed was sent to 2nd Depot Battalion (Bn) at Morphetville for training, during which, on 16 Jan 1916, he was allocated to 11th Reinforcements/27th Bn. On completion of training he embarked at Adelaide on 25 Mar 1916 aboard HMAT "*Adelaide*" bound for the Middle East, disembarking at Alexandria for further training.

On 29 May 1916 he embarked aboard HMAT "*Tunisian*" bound for France, disembarking at Marseilles on 5 Jun 1916. He was taken on strength by his unit (27th Bn) on 8 Aug 1916.

The 27th Bn (Unley's Own) was raised in 1915. It was the second of the predominantly SA Bns to be raised in WW 1 as part of the 1st AIF. It saw action in Gallipoli before being sent to the Western Front.

The Bn entered the front-line on the Western Front for the first time on 7 Apr 1916 at Armentieres before moving to the Somme. Three days before Ed joined his unit it was involved in a major attack near Bapaume; although the attack was successful, the unit suffered heavy casualties. He was brought forward as reinforcement as a result of these casualties.

However, his stay at the unit was rather brief as he was admitted to 13th Field Ambulance 10 days later, then evacuated to 2/1st Casualty Clearing Station, with mumps. He returned to his unit on 23 Sep 1916 near Zillebeke, in Belgium.

In early Oct 1916, the Bn undertook a number of small scale raids on the German line, capturing a number of prisoners, before they were withdrawn from the line on 27 Oct 1916 and transferred back to the Somme. There they took part in two unsuccessful attacks against German positions east of Flers. It was during the second of these attacks that Ed was killed in action (KIA) on 5 Nov 1916.

The usual delay in notifying next of kin and resolving the allocation of medals and scrolls then followed.

He is buried in the Commonwealth War Cemetery at Villers-Bretonneux. His photo is displayed in the Tumby Bay RSL Portraits Memorial.

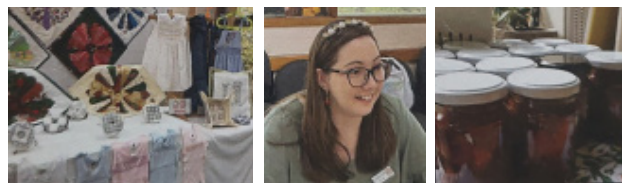

ANZAC BISCUITS

Ingredients:

- 1 cup of traditional rolled oats
- 1 cup of sifted plain flour
- 1 cup of caster sugar
- ¾ cup of desiccated coconut
- 125 grams of butter
- 1 tablespoon of golden syrup
- 2 tablespoons of boiling water
- 1 teaspoon of bicarbonate soda



Method:

1. Combine rolled oats, sifted plain flour, caster sugar and desiccated coconut in a bowl.
2. Heat butter and golden syrup over a low heat until butter is melted.
3. Mix boiling water with bicarbonate soda and add to the butter mixture.
4. Stir into the dry ingredients.
5. Form the mixture into balls on a greased oven tray.
6. Press the balls flat and bake in a slow oven for 20 mins or until golden brown at 150 degrees.
7. Loosen the biscuits while still warm.
8. Allow to cool on tray.
