Mayor's Message

Firstly, I would like to congratulate everyone who was involved in the recent Tumby 'Market @ the Bay'. The event was very well organised and had visitors come from around the Eyre Peninsula, as well as many locals as well. I am aware that is very much a team effort to put this event on, so I won't name everyone, but would like to thank all for their efforts into what is become one of the premier market events on the EP.

During this month, Council finalised their Long Term Financial plan, which provides direction for financial decision making for the next 10 years. Included in this process is the review of the detailed Asset Management plans for every piece of council assets across our whole district. This includes all our roads, buildings, stormwater infrastructure, and wastewater facilities. This is a significant body of work which requires much time and effort put in by staff so that council can have an accurate base on which to make their long term decisions. I'd like to thank the Council staff for this incredible body of work which helps set up our district's sustainability well into the future.

One of the important roles of a Mayor is to ensure that the perspectives of our community are heard from decision makers at other levels of government. This is an ongoing task, and in the last month I had the opportunity to meet with the State Environment Minister David Speirs. There are so many different areas of his portfolio which impact our council and community. One area which has been most pertinent recently has been the process around the transition of natural resource management from the EP NRM to the new EP Landscapes Board. I am looking forward to working with the new Landscapes Board when it is finalised, as the aim of these changes was to enable greater decision making to be made in each local area. Other areas which I was able to have discussions with Minister Speirs about included Coastal protection, native vegetation management, and management strategies for invasive native species such as galahs. It is so important that we continue to ensure that there is an understanding of our issues, concerns, and opportunities by those who are making decisions at higher levels.

Is your street numbering clearly visible?



Council encourages all property owners within townships to ensure their street number is clearly displayed at their property.

It is important that your numbering is clearly visible to allow properties to be quickly and easily located, which is particularly important in emergency situations.

Please note that all rural properties that are either a dwelling or a place of regular work should have a rural property address which is displayed using a uniform sign attached to a dropper post adjacent the property driveway. Any rural property owners who are unsure of their rural property address or who would like an address allocated for a currently un-addressed property should contact the Council office.

Under Section 220(6) of the Local Government Act 1999 an owner of land must, at the request of Council, ensure that the appropriate number for the owner's building or allotment is displayed in a form directed or approved by the Council. This means that

Residential

All premise numbers should be easily identifiable from a stationary vehicle located on the adjacent roadway. When properties have no street frontage numbers must be identifiable from the access road/private laneway adjacent to the property. For houses that are more than 1.5 m from the front boundary, the premise number should be placed on or near the front gate. If the premise has no front fence or gate, the number should be placed on the letterbox or other feature facing the street. [Australia Post prefers the premise numbers to be displayed on the letterbox where a letterbox is provided.] Ideally the numbers should be located 750 mm to 1.5 m above the ground level and on the left hand side of the door or gate. Numbers should be at least 75 mm high to ensure they can be seen from the roadway and use colour combinations which provide strong contrast between the number and the background, such as black and white. Visibility is improved by using retro-reflective material for either the number or the background. For numbers placed on letterboxes consider using raised numbering (tactile) to assist the vision impaired.

Industrial and Commercial Premises

Premise numbers should be displayed in a prominent position to the left side of the driveway main entrance and/or the façade of the building and in a way that makes it easy for the number to be seen clearly by pedestrians and motorists. Commercial buildings require the same type of premise numbers as residential premises. Although the minimum required height of number is 75 mm, larger numbers are encouraged. Owners should consider displaying numbers which are in scale with the size of the building and which enhance its appearance.

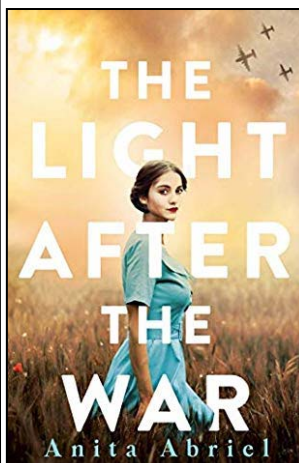

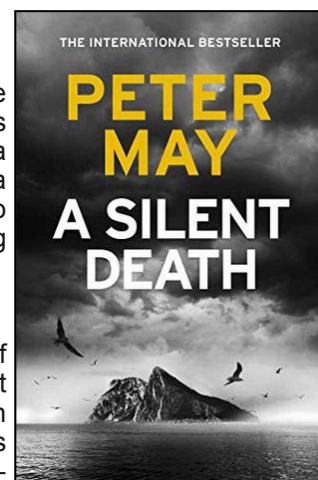

A SILENT LIFE

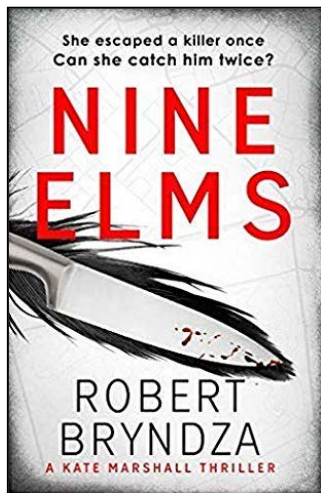

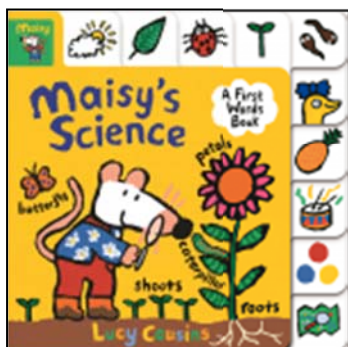
But when Kate was tasked with tracking down a vicious serial killer, even her instinct and ability to immerse herself in violent worlds couldn't help her find him - until he found her.

Autumn is an ideal time to bait foxes, as juveniles are dispersing and are easily attracted to a food source. The distribution days are from 9:30am to 11:30am at the following locations in March:

- Tumby Bay, NREP Office – Thursday 12th March

- Yallunda Flat Hall – Tuesday 17th March
- Port Neill, The Green Shed – Wednesday 18th March



The 'Fox Bait Distribution Days' encourages all landholders to control foxes at the same time (Autumn) to make a greater reduction and wider impact on fox numbers over the whole district. This can lead to higher stock production and environmental benefits. So it pays to get your neighbours baiting too!

If you missed one of our distribution days, you can still get fox baits from the Tumby NREP office by appointment. Frozen meat baits are free-of-charge to eligible landholders. Please bring in your bucket with a sealed lid, or one can be purchased for \$5. Manufactured FOXOFF® baits also available at cost.

A Soldier's Story

Fred was born on 14 March 1896 at Port Lincoln to Abraham Lincoln Schramm and Catherine Schramm (nee Simes). He was the 5th youngest of 14 children in the family, 10 boys and four girls. His father was a farmer at Whites River.

Fred went to Whites River School, leaving at grade 7. On completing his education he worked on the family farm until his enlistment in the Army on 20 March 1916 at the age of 20 years. At the time he gave his address as Whites River via Tumby Bay and his occupation as farmer.

After enlistment at Tumby Bay he was sent to Mitcham for processing on 23 March 1916 and then to 2nd Depot Battalion (Bn) to commence training on the same day. During training he was allocated to 48th Bn. On 26 June 1916 he embarked aboard HMAT "Barambah" from Melbourne, bound for Plymouth (UK), arriving on 26 August 1916 and marched into 3 Training Bn (UK). On 14 October 1916 he embarked from UK for Etaples (Fr) and was finally taken on strength by his unit (48th Bn) on 31 October 1916.

The 48th Bn was raised in Egypt on 16 March 1916 as part of the expansion of the AIF. The unit's personnel were mainly from South Australia and Western Australia. The Bn landed in France at Marseilles on 9 June 1916 and within a month was committed to the front line, taking part in the battle of Pozieres, suffering 598 casualties from a total strength of 1000. It was after this battle that Fred joined his unit.

However it was a short stay, as three weeks later he was admitted to 3rd Stationary Army Hospital at Rouen with mumps. He was released from hospital and re-joined his unit on 7 January 1917. His unit at this stage was located south of Ypres and endured one of the harshest winters on record.

On 10 April 1917 Fred was wounded in action (WIA) at the battle of Bullecourt and was admitted through 39th Casualty Clearing Station to 1st Army General Hospital with shrapnel wounds to the face. On 5 May 1917 he was released from hospital and returned to his unit. The Bn suffered 435 casualties at Bullecourt.

On 12 September 1917 he was granted 10 days leave to UK. This must have been a bad omen as within a month he was again WIA (12 October 1917) with shrapnel and gunshot wounds to his right arm during the battle of Passchendaele; he was evacuated through 5th Field Ambulance to 5th Army General Hospital at Rouen (Fr) before being embarked aboard the HS "Grantully Castle" for the UK and admitted to 3rd War General Hospital at Devonport (UK).

Whilst still in hospital in UK he was awarded the Military Medal, the citation for which reads in part; "At Passchendaele Ridge, North East of Oonbecke, on 12 October 1917 for great gallantry and devotion to duty, whilst acting as a stretcher bearer he displayed utter disregard for enemy machine gun fire. He continued carrying and caring for men found in shell holes during a heavy bombardment. His consistent bravery and skill saved the lives of many men." He re-joined his unit on 22 January 1918; the medal was presented in the field.

On 3 May 1918 he was again wounded in action with shrapnel wounds and admitted through 3rd Military Hospital and then transferred to Line of Communications Hospital. He re-joined his unit on 15 June 1918.

On 20 September 1918 he was again WIA during the last major action undertaken by his unit before the end of the war. This time with shrapnel wounds to his right hand; he was evacuated aboard the HS "St Patrick" and admitted to Southern General Hospital (UK). He was then classified as medically unfit and invalided back to Australia aboard SS "Takada", arriving in Adelaide on 4 February 1919.

He was discharged from the Army on 17 March 1919, returning to Tumby Bay and continued farming at Whites River with his brother Herbert (Bert). He remained on the farm until the late 40s when he was seriously injured when he fell from a dray; after recovering he retired to Port Lincoln.

On 9 March 1950 he married Molly Moswell in Adelaide and they returned to Port Lincoln.

He passed away on 6 January 1959 and is buried in the Port Lincoln (Happy Valley) Cemetery. His wife rests beside him.

Two of Fred's brothers also served during WW1, JK and Bert Schramm.
